Luke Winger wowed the campers and staff with many awesome juggling feats, some with the help of his own young children, and used them as a tool to teach a number of different lessons



throughout the week. He spoke on topics such as joy, honor, courage, and trust, and told stories from his life as a kid, a teacher, and an athlete. Luke's wife, Davianna, also spoke for one session using children's book she wrote to teach the campers about how to follow God in their daily lives.



Campers also had the opportunity to enjoy Mantastic Man Night and Girls Night. The guys stayed out in the woods at camp and played games, ate snacks, sang worship songs, and had deep conversations with other campers and their leaders around the campfire. The girls played some games, built a fire and cooked their food together, and got to ask their leaders difficult questions anonymously so that they could hear from women that have had similar struggles and learned from them. Junior High week was a great time of excitement, of learning, and of growth in faith for many campers. We were blessed with so many opportunities to point those campers to Jesus and to be a good example of His love in their lives.

Adventure Camp

Adventure Camp

Adventure Camp's theme this year was "Pursuing God through Projects." Over 30 children attended the three days that were filled with excitement, activities, praise and worship, teachings, laughter, fun and so much more.

The first night, we started out discovering what it meant to pursue God. Through discussion with the children, we discovered that we shouldn't ever stop going after God and learning more about Him. Over the course of three days, we studied nine Bible verses that each taught us one way that we can pursue God in our daily lives.

1. Talk to Him and write to Him from Proverbs 7:30. The children created their own journals with wood covers and colored pages to remind them to "write God's Word on the tablet of your heart." Included in each journal was a laminated page with all the Bible verses we studied while at camp.

2. Stick to Jesus and thirst for more of Him from John 4:13-14. With colorful stickers and lots of creativity, everyone decorated their own water bottle to remind them that "whoever drinks of the water that I will give him shall never thirst."

3. **Read our Bibles** from 2 Timothy 3:16. Knowing they could start anywhere and read at whatever pace they wanted, children learned that our Bibles help "teach us what is true" and "realize what is wrong in our lives." We made bookmarks for our Bibles together.

4. **Pray** from 1 Thessalonians 5:17. After reading "Peter's Perfect Prayer Place," children were able to create a fleece tie pillow to remind them to "pray without ceasing," when they wake up, before bed, or anytime they want!

5. Ask others about God and listen to Him, from Proverbs 3:6. Children got to stamp their name on a wooden walkie talkie and decorate it to remind them to talk to others about Him, and always "listen for God's voice in everything you do."

6. **Seek Him** from Jeremiah 29:13. Provided with their own plaster of Paris block, children dug deep to find the polished rocks hidden within. We talked about how we can dig and dig, but never reach the bottom of the knowledge of God, and we should wake each day eager to dig because there is treasure in finding God when we "seek Him with all your heart."

7. Learn who God is and be yourself from Colossians 1:16-17. We made Jacob's ladders and learned that even when we feel like we are falling apart, God's love will always hold us together, much like the ribbons that were woven through the pieces of wood. Children learned that they never have to feel like they "have it all together," before they come to God because His love is unconditional and "in Him, all things hold together."

8. **Get involved** from Matthew 20:28. Since Jesus came "not to be served, but to serve," we learned many ways that we can follow His example and serve others. Going to church, helping a neighbor, sending cards to people, donating food, picking up trash...we learned that we don't have to be perfect to help others. We are all beautifully broken, just like a puzzle-which each child got to make and take home.

9. Love and enjoy Him every day from 1 Corinthians 16:14. Children had fun creating their own Shrinky-Dinks to remind them to "do everything in love," each and every day.

To finish up the amazing 3 days, children had a scavenger hunt for jumbo puzzle pieces. Once put together, the children read the message: I have decided to follow Jesus. We went over the ABC's of becoming a Christian.

Camp was jam packed! I can't wait for next year with incredible 6 to 8-year-olds! ■


